# ChicagoFest: America's biggest and best music fest

Like anything else in its formative years, ChicagoFest must learn to walk before it can run; and in the fourth time around, ChicagoFest '81 is beginning to break stride.

Tom Drilias, head of Festivals, Inc., has said he is looking to "standardize the fest" as he searches for the right number of days for the festival. This year's 12-day fest (July 29-Aug. 9) seems to be the perfect compromise between last year's 15 days and the first year's ten-day fest.

ChicagoFest is maturing in other ways. Thanks to WBBM-TV's Susan Anderson, the cinema room, roller rink and disco have been shut down. Her 1980 investigation of that area of Navy Pier uncovered faulty wiring. That's all right, because if those areas weren't closed for faulty wiring, they should have been closed for faulty ventilation. Watching a movie in the cinema room was like 'video sauna." Crowd control should also be better without these features.

The ethnic stage also has been eliminated, and that's too bad because it offered good insight into many different musical persuasions. The city must figure this year's ethnic festivals as a fair tradeoff.

In past years, ChicagoFest unjustifiably has taken a rap for not being a family affair. The comfortable Kraft Senior Citizens Area is back with entertainment from the Sweet Adelines and the Chi Tones. The Children's Entertainment Area will have special shows every day on the hour from noon until 4 PM. Other family events might include a boat ride from Chicago-From-The-Lake Ltd. (for a separate admission); the Pictures of People exhibit, which features memorable photos from People magazine, and a call to Grandma courtesy of MCI. The national long distance company will demonstrate their service with free phone calls to MCI cities. Take that, Illinois Bell.

As usual, the music is the backbone of ChicagoFest. About \$1 million of festival's \$5 million budget is earmarked for music. That pays for 14 separate entertainment areas in rock, jazz, blues, country, pop, folk, and comedy. A total of 50 dif-ferent performances will occur over the 40-acre area at Navy Pier.

In return, you will pay \$6 at the gate of \$4 in advance. The ticket prices are up \$1 at the gate and 50¢ in advance from last year. Senior citizens aged 62 and over will pay \$1 and children under ten will be charged 50c. The increase will go toward renovating Navy

"We expect this modest increase in ticket prices will help pay for more than \$250,000 worth of repairs and refurbishing for Navy Pier. The festival is popular and profitable and with this small ticket price increase it will be assuming a fair share of the expenses involved in upgrading Navy Pier," Mayor Jane Byrne.

And, Navy Pier, in its present state, is the orst thing about ChicagoFest. When the Pier is renovated, it could become the best thing, if promoters decide to return to the Navy Pier is a natural site for ChicagoFest. The potential exists for the pier to be the showcase of Chicago just as Faneuil Hall (a farmer's market and shopping center) is a focal point in Boston. Byrne wants to bring developer James Rouse (who worked on renovating the waterfronts in Boston and Baltimore) to Chicago. Byrne and Taste of Chicago planner Arnie Morton (of Arnie's) have traveled to many marketplace/shopping centers, as Morton has predicted Navy Pier could become a farmer's market, restaurant, and boutique center drawing up to 20 million shoppers a

Chicago Public Works Commissioner Jerome Butler Jr. has said the initial work scheduled for Navy Pier includes general construction, painting, masonry, carpentry, glazing, upgrading of electrical wiring, new fencing, and upgrading the Pier's communication system.

So for what may or may not be the last year, Fest-goers will have to put up with the crowds and sometimes glum conditions at Navy Pier. Next year's Fest site is up in the air as Meigs Field and Soldier Field have been suggested. Navy Pier will still be undergoing renovation.

Besides the slew of entertainers (which you can read about elsewhere in this section), WMET will be sponsoring its

fireworks and light show every night at 9:30; the marketplace will return with arts, crafts and souvenirs; WBBM-AM will be sponsoring "The Bob and Betty Show" as well as "Sportstalk" with Harry Caray and Dave Eanet; and Olympia Beer will bring its "Chicago Sports Hall of Fame" back to ChicagoFest. The WLUP game arcade also

Live radio broadcasts will be conducted by WGN, WLS-FM, WMET, WOJO, WX-RT, WLUP, and Q-101. From July 29-31 Channel 2's "Noonbreak" will broadcast live from the Fest, and special booths will be set up where folks can hang out with personalities from Channel 5, WBEZ, and

Food also will be available at ChicagoFest as nearly 70 area restaurants will serve their specialties along the midway at normal inhouse prices. Only beer will be served on ChicagoFest grounds. Beer prices are a steep 75¢ when compared to the Milwaukee SummerFest's 50¢

The Hispanic community will be represented with the WOJO Radio Fiesta Stage. Located on the main concourse on the west end of Navy Pier, the stage will present live continuous Hispanic entertainment from 7 PM to midnight. For special details, listen to WOJO.

Much to the dismay of the residents of Lake Point Towers, the carnival midway will return to ChicagoFest after a two-year hiatus. The Lake Point residents complained about the midway during the first ChicagoFest, so the midway has been scaled down to eight rides. Four of the rides will be for adults, and four are for kids. Festgoers pay as they ride.

ChicagoFest has attracted increasing numbers of people since its debut three summers ago. More than 500,000 attended the first Fest, more that 600,000 attended the second, and about 900,000 attended last year's. With excellent weather, this year's gate could top 1 million. ChicagoFest has been cited by the Chicago Convention and Tourism Bureau as a major factor for an increase in the number of visitors to the city in

And now that ChicagoFest is beginning to streamline it's many activities while offering a wide range of musical and entertainment options, it truely is becoming what promoters have labeled "America's Biggest and Best Music Fest."

#### How to get there

The very first ChicagoFest had a midway full of thrilling rides. That was eliminated as planners discovered even the best carnival ride couldn't compete with the ride to ChicagoFest. Here, in order of sensibility, are the best ways to arrive at

ChicagoFest . . . in one piece:

BY TRAIN—If you live in the suburbs, take the train. RTA schedule cuts won't take effect until Labor Day, so you can stay late. A free shuttle bus will run to and from all train stations from 5:30 PM to 12:30 AM on weekdays, and 11:30 AM to 12:30 AM weekends

CTA SUBWAY— If you live in the city, you have two choices: the subway or the bus. The subway exits either at Grand and State or Grand and Milwaukee with a transfer to Route No. 65.

CTA BUS—Exit at Grand Avenue on all Michigan Avenue North-South routes; transfer to Route No. 65. There is also direct service from the loop on Route No. 15 (Canal-Wacker) Monday-Friday until 7 PM. Extra service will be provided direct to ChicagoFest via the Grand Avenue bus Route No. 65.

BY CAR-You asked for it . no parking at Navy Pier. Try the Soldier Field lots, where a free shuttle bus service will run from 11:30 AM to 12:30 AM every day EXCEPT Aug. 8, when a Chicago Bears game will preempt the bus. You can also park at the Grant Park Underground on Michigan Avenue where a free shuttle bus will run from 5:30 PM to 12:30 AM on weekdays and 11:30 AM to 12:30 AM on  $\geq$ weekends.

## Main Stage

#### Chaka Kahn

July 29

7:30 p.m.

It's appropriate that Chaka Khan will kickoff Main Stage entertainment for ChicagoFest '81, because like the Fest, Chaka has something for everyone.

It's hard to pigeonhole Khan, as her career has taken yet another turn, this time into jazz. Chaka started her career in 1973 as a lead singer for the funk band Rufus. At that time there was little distinction between Khan and other singers like Natalie Cole or Minnie Riperton.

Khan's big break came in 1974, when Stevie Wonder wrote "Tell Me Something Good," which led to a Grammy Award for the band. After the hit single, Rufus moved more into the area between soul and rock. Chaka left the band in 1977, just in time for the disco craze, and until recently, she was most associated with disco. Today, her music blends jazz, pop ("We Can Work It Out") is part of her show), funk and disco. And even if you don't like all that, you still gotta admire the lady's name.

Look for Khan to perform the touted "Night In Tunisia," Dizzy Gillespie's 1944 classic, as well as "Night Moods," a jazz number penned by the singer. Both songs are off her newest album, What 'Cha Gonna Do For Me?

An interesting sidelight about the roots of Chaka Khan is that "Rufus" was an outgrowth of the mid-1960's Chicago band the American Breed, who had hits like "Bend Me Shape Me." The band first called themselves Ask Rufus, lifted from a question and answer column in Mechanics Illustrated.

#### Dazz

"Danceable jazz" is the way leader Rob Harris describes the music of Dazz. The refined ten-piece horn band hails from the Kinsman Avenue area of Cleveland's East Side, where they perfected their musical concept as the house band at the Kinsman Grill. The fiery backbeats of their well-crafted rhythm section echo influences from Jeff Beck and Larry Coryell to Billy Cobham.

Two albums for 20th Century Fox Records have preceded two for Motown. All four LPs have yielded pop hits, including 'Might As Well Forget About Lovin' You' and "Catchin' Up On Love." Tender, pleading vocals and a silky R&B foundation give Dazz the tools to "make the ladies lay right down and cry."

#### **Teddy Pendergrass**

July 30

A singer at age two; a drummer at 13; and now at 31, Teddy Pendergrass is one of the finest soul performers of the decade.

Almost ten years ago, Pendergrass was introduced to music fans via Harold Melvin and the Blue Notes' hit, "If You Don't Know Me By Now." Teddy had joined an earlier version of the Blue Notes in his hometown of Philadelphia as the group's drummer, but soon found his vocal niche. That song touched off a string of Blue Note hits, under the direction of Kenny Gamble and Leon Huff, such as "The Love I Lost," "Bad Luck" and "To Be True."

Teddy stayed on with Gamble/Huff's Philadelphia International Records when the Blue Notes broke up in 1976. His first solo LP, simply titled Teddy Pendergrass, went platinum on the strength of three hit singles which also established Pendergrass as a disco star, including his current show opener, "You Can't Hide From Yourself."

Quiet and soft-spoken offstage,

Quiet and soft-spoken offstage, Pendergrass believes his message of love and humanity is one way to spread The Word. Yet he won't deny that sexy, sensuous side which makes the ladies in the audience swoon over "the Teddy Bear."

Accenting Pendergrass' perfect vocal interpretations of mellow ballads and uptempo funk songs is the Teddy Bear Band and Teddy's Angels, three female backup vocalists. The combination makes for an evening of inspired — and inspiring — pure entertainment.

#### The Reddings



respectively. Commercially, the moves

following has always come from the Chicago area, where the pair grew up and developed their musical styles. The Main Stage may not be as intimate as the Earl of Old Town, especially for folk music; but the space is needed to accomodate Goodman and Prine's many fans.

Folks should be in for a good show, Goodman will no doubt perform his current single release, "A Dying Cub Fan's Last Request." Goodman also has a new song, (cowritten by Mike Smith), that pays homage to Elvis imitators. Goodman, 32, probably will play some selections from his last Asylum album, Hot Spot; and mix that slicker-sounding recent material with older standbys such as "City of New Orleans" and "The Dutchman." Look for Evanston's famous mandolin player, Jethro Burns, to show up.

It's anybody's guess as to what to expect from Prine. It's been a year and a half since his last album (Storm Windows). The last couple of albums saw Prine point toward rockabilly while keeping a committment to his acoustic material.

Unlike Goodman, Prine, 35, has experience on the ChicagoFest Main Stage, headlining with the Dirt Band last year. His rock songs such as "Saigon" came off all right before the massive crowd.



Whenever Prine and Goodman get together it is safe to bet on a guest appearance by someone, so don't be surprised if some other Chicago folk artist wanders onstage towards the end of the concert. (Bonnie Koloc is playing ChicagoFest three days later).

#### Chicago

When recalling the band Chicago's return to perform in their namesake town in the early '70s one can't keep away the memory of when Hizzonner Mayor Daley joined the boys for a few confused moments in front of local TV cameras. Daley, bless his soul, knew there had to be something special about the organization bearing his city's name, even if he wasn't quite sure of the facts.

As the years tick by, you can see Daley's dilemma springing up again — only now it's the younger concert goers who know the band Chicago demands respect, even if they don't exactly know why. Born too late to be part of the band's first heydays, the new ears of America didn't create Chicago's status, but they do continue to salute it.



The bands' ChicagoFest appearance two years ago drew a capacity crowd of over 150,000 to the Main Stage. Since that time they have released their 14th album (the one with the thumbprint) and replaced teen heartthrob guitarist Donnie Dacus with Chris Pinnick.

Pinnick's leanings are definitely toward rock 'n' roll, and this injection is prime reflection of the "new Chicago" philosophy. While Chicago wouldn't be Chicago without its fabled horn section, their most recent album is clearly a move away from dominating brass.

This calculated shift is Chicago's way of revamping for the Eighties, staying palatable to the younger listeners who grew up listening to Leif Garrett, and not to jazz-rock. Making transitions is never an easy task, and Chicago has made its share of dubious moves.

But through it all, their albums have continued to sell in heavy metal degrees of gold and platinum. Their core of fans is fiercely loyal, despite the fact that the post-hippie intellect once making up their largest audience has for all practical purposes splintered away.

Keyboardist Robert Lamm says the band is far from shedding tears about the evolution of things, and that he has no real desire to live in the past tense. "The early space cadet and Stravinsky stuff we were doing I think of now as rather pretentious," he said in a 1980 Illinois Entertainer interview.

## Bobby Vinton

Aug. 2 3:00 & 7:00 p.m.

Bobby Vinton and ChicagoFest come together like futility and the Cubs. Since Vinton released "My Melody Of Love," a song dedicated to the Polish community, Chicago (which has the largest Polish community outside of Warsaw) has fallen in love with Vinton.

Vinton, who has always been proud of his Polish background, released "My Melody Of Love" in 1974 to show appreciation for the Poles who had supported him. He wrote the song with hopes that it would become the first Polish-American hit and his own contribution to Vinton's cultural tradition.

In fact, Vinton spent \$50,000 of his own money to produce the song and he took it to seven major record companies for distribution. He was rejected seven times until ABC Records took a chance on the Polish song.

Of course, all the "Polish Prince" fame is merely the second time around for Vinton. He has sold more than 30 million records going back to 1962. Vinton no doubt will perform standards such as "Roses Are Red," "Blue On Blue," "Blue Velvet," "There I've Said It Again," and our personal favorite, "Mr. Lonely." All these songs are perfect for the lethargic eighties.

Still, Vinton and his warm-up act, the Lennon Sisters, should provide for some worthwhile family entertainment on a Sun-

all, is the only entertainer to have three simultaneous contracts with major Las Vegas hotels, and according to his management, Vinton has had more hit singles between 1962 and 1973 than any other male artist

Over the past five years, Bobby has been honored by more than 100 national organizations and more than a dozen mayors of U.S. cities for his contributions to their ethnic communities.

Vinton's latest album release, *Encore*, features some gospel, Country & Western, and adult contemporary selections. It was released on the Tapestry label in October. Vinton is in the midst of a summer tour.

#### Aretha Franklin

Aug. 3

7:30 p.m.

The undisputed Queen of Soul, Aretha Franklin, has traveled a long way from her father's Detroit church, but her gospel roots are still a major facet of her music. It was in the church of Rev. C.L. Franklin that she began recording in the mid-1950s, but it wasn't until 1967 that she became an "overnight" star, thanks to producer Jerry Wexler, who knew how to handle her earthy sound, and a song called "I Never Loved A Man (The Way That I Loved You)."

Hits like "Baby I Love You," "Chain Of Fools" and "Respect" brought her more national acclaim and one gold record after another. More recently, a hit "comeback" album and a critically applauded appearance

in The Blues Brothers movie (singing her classic "Think") have put her on top once again.

Four Tops

Sharing the bill are the Four Tops, the venerable quartet that came to prominence under the Motown banner in 1964 with "Baby I Need Your Loving." Hailing like Aretha from Detroit, the group first cut for Chicago's Chess Records in the mid-'50s. But it was the Motor City songwriting genius of Holland-Dozier-Holland that put the

Tops over the top.

"I Can't Help Myself," "Reach Out I'll
Be There," and a host of others hit for the
group, and they plan a new album release
shortly. Amazingly, lead singer Levi Stubbs,
Duke Fakir, Obie Benson and Larry Payton
have remained together for a quarter of a
century without becoming "oldies but
goodies."

really the case because our album has sold more than one million copies, but even if that were the case, I don't know why that necessarily has to be bad."

The fact that many have labeled Air Supply's music as "wimpy" doesn't seem to bother Russell, either.

"We've been playing in Australia for about six years, (where "Love And Other Bruises" was Top 3 in 1976) and we constantly were called wimps over there. We stopped playing live shows for awhile

because the audiences were just out of hand, but our success in the United States has helped things a lot back home."

While Air Supply is noted for its slower ballad material, Russell said it would be un-fair to say the band only does ballads.

"We do some stuff that's more uptempo, and the new album will have some more of it, too," he said.

Russell said he doesn't believe that, as some have alleged, all of Air Supply's songs sound alike.

"We definitely have a style of our own," he said, "but I think that's good. I'd like people to know it's us when they hear one of our songs on the radio. The Beatles are my biggest influence, and they sure had a unique style of their own, too. Obviously, we're not the Beatles, but I don't think it's bad to have your own style."

#### Cheap Trick

Aug. 5

7:30 p.m.

It's beginning to dawn on everyone: "What happened to Cheap Trick?" Indeed, since last fall's Randy Men club dates and the short-lived All Shook Up LP, not a lot's been heard about them.

Lest one think Cheap Trick has been holed up in native Rockford, manager Ken Adamany sets the record straight. Since Pete Comita joined the fold last October, the band has toured Canada, Japan, Greece, Spain, Italy, Germany, Holland, Puerto Rico and Hawaii. And although a seventh album is yet to be recorded and a new label deal yet to be officiated, the band's next 45 will be on Elektra. The song, entitled "Reach Out" and co-authored by Comita (his collaborator unannounced but not key songwriter Rick Nielsen), is culled from the soundtrack for the movie Heavy Metal. This, in turn, has spawned much talk

throughout the industry that Cheap Trick has pacted with Elektra, licensees of the soundtrack album. Manager Adamany, however, refuses comment, looking to a mid-August announcement.

Cheap Trick also recorded three cuts for another soundtrack, that of an animated film called *Drats* due for October release.

The individual members - Comita Nielsen, Robin Zander and Bun E. Carlos have been working on individual projects. They've been playing with their friends," Adamany says. Nielsen is presently assisting with the compilation of songs for Off Broadway's next album, although that group too is presently without announcement of a contract. He's also helped Chicagoans Loose Lips in the studio; Nielsen and Lips leadman Richie Mayer have been friends and fellow guitar hobbyists for years. Finally, drummer Carlos, to the disappointment of dozens of female fans, recently tied the knot.

Although we're without a lot of the facts about Cheap Trick's recent past and future, they're alive, well, and treating ChicagoFest patrons to their only Midwest appearance in close to a year. Some factors are, conceded-ly, All Shook Up. But from international reports, the music is rockin' without domestic problems.

#### **Cold Chisel**

the Australian quintet Cold Chisel will be making their Chicago debut an auspicious one when they open for Cheap Trick on the Main Stage at ChicagoFest.

Although new to American audiences (their U.S. debut LP, East, was recently released), the band has released two earlier Aussie albums since their formation in the mid-Seventies. Combining literate, often thought-provoking lyrics with stylistically varied music, Cold Chisel has become quite a success in their homeland, winning awards in nine categories in a 1980 reader's poll in Australia's leading music paper, RAM.

Now in their second decade as entertainers, the Commodores have expanded their sound to include hints of jazz, gospel influences, Sam Cooke-flavored R & B, and lyrics with a social message, all in addition to their famed funk tunes and love ballads. Their 1978 hit "Three Times A Lady" garnered them the Juke Box Award for Song of The Year; and the group was nominated for 1980 Grammies for Best Pop Vocal Group Performance ("Sail On") and Best R & B Vocal Group Performance (Midnight

Lead vocalist Lionel Richie is a hitmaker



in his own right, today, coming off the success of his production of Kenny Rogers' "Lady." Now he's done the same for Rogers' new LP Share Your Love, in the Top Ten after only three weeks on the charts. And his duet with Diana Ross on the

title theme song from Endless Love is charging up the charts as well.

Just released by the group is *In The Pocket*, a collection of eight funky love songs sure to be a hit with listeners across America. Opting for a more casually col-

legiate look (sweaters and Commodores designer jeans), the vocal sextet promises another of their patented flashy shows, which have included fireworks, flashpots, lasers, and a special \$150,000 stage set, culminating in high-energy entertainment, Commodores style.

Guitarist Thomas McClary, keyboardist Milan Williams, drummer Walter Orange, lead singer Richie, trumpeter William King and bassist Ronald LaPread have been taking audiences into their fold ever since their days together at the Tuskegee Institute. It's been said that the key to their success is their diverse college degrees, allowing each member to contribute to the organization in the area in which they are strongest. But it's hard to discount the music.

#### .38 Special

Over the past seven years, .38 Special has evolved from a heavily country-flavored Jacksonville, Florida hillbilly group into a bluesy, ballsy, full-fledged kick-ass rock 'n' roll band, drawing on influences from such diverse sources as the Cars and British heavy

These sweeping changes in musical con-cepts and directions shocked the band's legion of Confederate flag-waving rebel fans, who expected .38 Special to fill the void left by the breakup of the Allman Brothers Band and the tragic demise of Lynyrd Skynyrd, but the creative growth and expansion proved essential to the band's

.38 Special's live performances had been flash-frying audiences across the country, yet it was their sizzling 1979 album, a marked departure in musical style entitled Rockin' Into The Night (with its single release/title track written by Chicago's own eternal rocker, Jim Peterik), which proved to be the catalyst necessary to revitalize the band's faltering record sales.

Wild-Eyed Southern Boys .38 Special's newest recording (with Peterik again penning the album's exuberant title track as well as three additional songs), is the band's most ambitious and instrumentally authoritative effort to date.

Sparked by the hit singles "Fantasy Girl" and "Hold On Loosely," the album fully captures .38 Special's brutally succinct live sound, while also serving as a musical showcase for Donnie Van Zant's potent and emotional vocal gymnastics, the dynamic dual lead guitar work of Don Barnes and

Jeff Carlisi, and the tireless intensity of the band's rhythm section, bassist Larry Junstrom and drummers Steve Brookins and Jack Grondin.

#### The Dregs

The Dregs, on the other hand, bear little resemblance to the image of a down-home, pickin' and grinnin' bluegrass band that their name conjured before they dropped the Dixie. An entirely instrumental band, the Dregs have combined elements of rock, jazz, classical and bluegrass influences into a unique and eclectic musical fusion, currently on display on Unsung Heroes.

Despite this diversity of style, the Dregs can boogie with the best of them, as witnessed by their stellar, high-voltage performance at last year's ChicagoFest.



Lovely, long-haired chanteuse Brenda Gail Webb changed her name to Crystal Gayle upon a suggestion from older sister Loretta Lynn.

Although they're siblings, the two country superstars have very little in common. Loretta was born a poor "Coal Miner's Daughter" in Butcher Holler, Kentucky. Shortly after Crystal was born, the Webb family moved to Indiana where the youngest of eight began performing for high school and community shows. Big sister Loretta gave Crystal a job with her road show during the summer breaks, but soon she went solo, hoping to achieve fame on her own merits. By 1974, Crystal (a name she got from a

Dixie hamburger chain) had a soaring solo career with country hits like "This Is My Year For Mexico," "I'll Get Over You" and 'Don't It Make My Brown Eyes Blue." Rather than label herself a country singer, the versatile songbird chose to vary music, from torchy blues to dreamy ballads to country rock. Consequently, she's won crossover stardom and numerous musical awards, competing in categories against her own sister.

The five-foot-two, 100-pound beauty has appeared on numerous talk and variety shows. She's also hosted "The Midnight Special" and her own TV special. There's been talk of films in her career, yet Crystal is content to take things slowly, preferring to lay back on her Nashville farm with her husband, (high school sweetheart Vassilios Gatzimos) and her many pets.

#### **Rodney Crowell**

Opening the show for Crystal will be wellknown singer/songwriter Rodney Crowell, formerly of Emmylou Harris' Hot Band. Crowell has written tunes recorded by the likes of Willie, Waylon, Emmylou, the Oak Ridge Boys and Johnny Cash (who is Rodney's father-in-law since he married daughter Rosanne).

Rodney also produces his own records, as well as those of his wife and cronies. Look for his third solo LP soon. He now tours with other ex-Hot Banders (the Cherry Bombs — Hank DeVito, Tony Brown, Albert Lee, Larrie Londin, Emory Gordy, Jr., Rosemary Butler and sometimes Rosanne) playing his hits like "Ain't Livin' Long Like This" and "Leavin' Louisiana."



#### Mickey Gilley Johnny Lee Hank Williams Jr., Con Hunley Joe Ely Don King

With the advent of the Urban Cowboy craze, Mickey Gilley has become an international star, after years in the shadow of his crazy cousin, Jerry Lee Lewis. The two Louisiana kin both played a unique, rockin' piano at the start of rockabilly in the '50s, but it was the "Killer" who went on to become the infamous rock 'n' roll star, while cousin Mick spent most of his years building a following in Texas honky-tonks. So strong was the charming Gilley's ap-

peal as a versatile club entertainer that Texas entrepreneur, Sherwood Cryer, decided to invest in him. Thus, "Gilley's" honky-tonk was born in Pasadena, Texas, complete with mechanical bull, two-step dancing, live

bands and Gilley's beer. This true Texas phenomenon prompted an Esquire writer to turn his short story on the lifestyle of Gilley's goers into a film, which resulted in the cowboy fad that replaced disco in the clubs of America.

Along with Gilley's stardom came recognition for his bandleader, bearded Johnny Lee, a single guy from the oil refin-ing town of Texas City, who is the epitome of the real urban cowboy. Lee's pop/country hit "Lookin' For Love" made the Texas club veteran an overnight success. Now a solo artist who shares back-up group the Urban Cowboy Band with Gilley, Lee has his own album out featuring follow-up hits like "Pickin' Up Strangers.

Although he's the son of Country Music's late legend Hank "Bocephus" Williams Jr. (a nickname his dad gave him) would rather play alongside outlaw country rockers like Marshall Tucker, the Allman Brothers and Waylon Jennings, than worry about the Grand Ole Opry

For the most of his 33 years, Hank, Jr. liv ed a schizoid existence as a famous country clone of his dad. By age 18 he nearly died in the same manner as his father, from an overdose of pills and booze. Thanks to a stomach pump and a good shrink, Hank fled Nashville to find his own identity and evolve his own style into a progressive type of bluesy country-rock music.

Just when he began to overcome the past, the avid outdoorsman suffered a mountain fall, resulting in years of painful plastic surgery. The resilient "Bocephus" managed to bounce back again with even fresher music. Never afraid to tamper with sacred musical "family traditions," today Hank, Jr. plays both daddy's music (his way) and his original material to both old and new country fans.

Rounding out the evening will be three singer/songwriters, each representing a dif-ferent style of today's country music.
